

HOW TO TAKE A "GOOD" CELL PHONE PICTURE

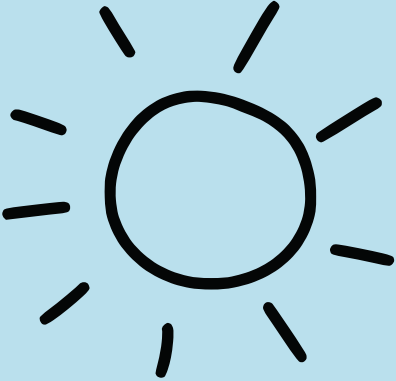


IN 6 STEPS



1) LIGHTING

Find a location with even light -all shadows, or all sunlight, if outdoors. (The sun should always be behind the subject). If indoors, use a window as side-light (the window is to the side). If natural light is not able, use what lighting you can indoors (overhead lighting is better than side lamps).



2) LOCATION

Find the light first, then location. Try to find a location with less distractions in the background. The simpler the background the better.



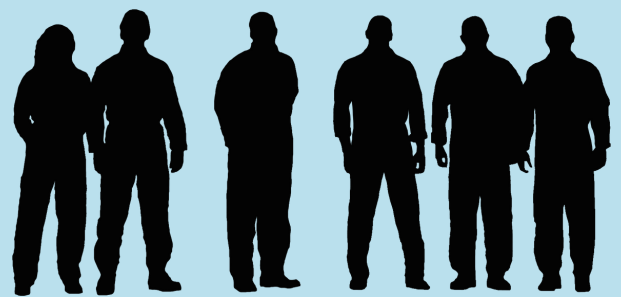
3) SUBJECT (OR PEOPLE)

Position your subject at your chosen location and double check that there is no harsh light or strong shadows on your subject. The more even the light is, the better.



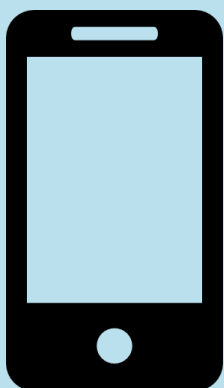
4) LARGE GROUP OF PEOPLE?

Try to position the taller people in the back, and shorter people in the front. Always make sure everyone's eyes can be seen. And double check for shadows/harsh light on everyone's faces.



5) TAKE THE PICTURE

Make sure everyone is in the picture and take a vertical and horizon picture. Try not to crop feet-you can always move closer for a close-up picture.
